

- Educators are actively improving their skills to align assessment and instruction with the latest educational research findings, with support from the Division learning team's targeted professional development.






Did you know?

Renovations and an addition to Kelvington High will allow Robert Melrose Elementary students to join the school in a K-12 setting.






Safe & Caring

The mental health and well-being of students and staff in Horizon is of the highest priority. Supports and training that contribute to our Safe & Caring goal include:

- Our Board of Education has committed to ensuring that all students are CPR/First Aid certified before leaving Grade 12.
- Partnerships with organizations who provide safety workshops on topics including distracted driving, bike, railway, and agriculture safety.
- Mental Health First Aid and Mental Health First Aid First Nations, including one MHFA trained staff in each school.
- The Headstrong Program including Headstrong Summits, Mental Health Symposiums, and Horizons Leadership Conferences.
- Nonviolent Crisis Intervention® training (NVCI).
- safeTALK.
- Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST).
- · Calm app access for staff and families.
- Violence Threat Risk Assessment (VTRA) and VTRA from an Indigenous Perspective.
- Traumatic Events Response Team support (TERT).
- The Leader in Me program (Covey).

Did you know?


During the 2022-23 school year, Horizon's buses travelled an average of 26,512 km every school day. To put this into perspective, imagine setting off from Humboldt and following the 52nd parallel to the east or west; this daily distance would take you all the way around the earth!







To graduate within the typical three-year period after beginning Grade 10, students must earn 24 secondary-level credits by the end of Grade 12. Last school year, Horizon's three-year graduation rates were measured at 83 per cent; an increase of three percentage points from the year before, and nine per cent higher than the provincial average.

- 2 federally-funded PreK.


HEYFRC

Indigenous Education

Horizon School Division embraces a path of cultural understanding and respect through Indigenous education initiatives and leadership from our Board Trustees. Along with professional learning and a focus on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls to Action, our Board participates in the Saskatchewan School Board Association's Indigenous Liaison Committee which created the Indigenous Education Responsibility Framework – a self-assessment tool designed to help school divisions evaluate, plan and report Indigenous Education activities.

In the classroom:

Resource Kits – Our Indigenous Education team has created resource kits that weave Cree & Saulteaux languages, medicine wheel teachings, and more into the fabric of our daily learning.

Revolutionizing Assessment – After combining Fountas & Pinnell and Eagle Crest assessment tools to reflect our students' identities, we are seeing a leap in engagement and understanding among our Indigenous students.

Events & Professional Development – Blanket Exercises, school powwows, traditional hand games, teepee teachings, outdoor classrooms, Treaty education PD and Residential School presentations empower students and staff to learn and lead with knowledge and empathy.
