AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Please note that all awards listed are competitive in nature. To be eligible to receive awards, students must complete the HCI Application form. Eligibility for an award does not imply that an applicant will receive that award. All awards criteria and information are accurate as of the date of posting. Please read all scholarships carefully as some need to be submitted to an organization outside of HCI by the specified deadline. To qualify for the following scholarships and awards, students must be graduating from HCI in June of 2021

1. Antoinette (Tony) Pitzel Award

- a. Must demonstrate a commitment to tasks
- b. Must be entering an office administration or business related field

2. Arts Humboldt Fine Arts Award - est. 2017

- a. Must demonstrate academic proficiency
- b. Must demonstrate a high degree of involvement in dramatic or theatre arts
- c. Must be attending a post-secondary institution as a full-time student in fine arts

3. BHP Jansen Project High School Scholarships (2 designated for HCI students)

- a. Be graduating from Grade 12 in June 2021 and will be attending a post-secondary program at a University, College or Technical Institution in 2021-2022, OR
- b. Obtained your Grade 12 (includes Grade 12 equivalency) in previous years, **AND** are under the age of 30 as of June 2021, **AND** are accepted or enrolled in a post-secondary program at a University, College or Technical Institution for the first time in 2021-2022

4. Bob Ford Memorial Photography Award

- a. Demonstrates a high degree of involvement, participation, and photography skills

5. Boyden Family Scholarship

- a. Must demonstrate academic excellence with a proficiency in the sciences
- b. Must be attending college or university in the following year
- c. Must be pursuing a program in science or technology
- d. Must be involved in school activities and demonstrate leadership in clubs or organizations
- e. Must be dedicated to school work
- f. Must be community-minded; volunteering with the school or city
- g. Must be a leader who has outstanding leadership skills and the ability to communicate with peers

6. Brody Hinz Memorial Character Awards - est. 2018

In honour of Brody Hinz, a graduating student of Humboldt Collegiate Institute who lost his life in the bus tragedy of 2018, these awards were established to honour his memory and his impact in the community and throughout the halls of Humboldt Collegiate. These awards represent what Brody stood for:

- a. Someone who demonstrates integrity and generosity by always being willing to help others in need
- b. Must demonstrate Humboldt Collegiate's virtues:
 - i. Respect for Self and Others
 - ii. Trust and Loyalty
 - iii. Justice and Fairness
 - iv. Patience and Understanding
 - v. Responsibility and Leadership
 - vi. Honesty
 - vii. Self-Discipline
 - viii. Humility
- c. May be community-minded, volunteering with the school or community
- d. May demonstrate leadership in the area of anti-bullying, leading by example and being an advocate for others

7. Cecilia Poole Award

- a. Must be intending to enter a post-secondary program in education
- b. Must not be a multiple award winner (>\$1000 in scholarships awarded)

8. Conexus Community Youth Leadership Awards

- a. Graduating from high school in Saskatchewan in the 2020/2021 academic year
- b. Parent/Guardian are Conexus Credit Union members and have been for at least one year, with all accounts in good standing
- c. Submit the application no later than **April 16, 2021**

- e. Applications can be submitted directly to Conexus on the application website

9. D. Ronald Bell Awards (one male and one female recipient)

- a. Must be an active volunteer in both school and community
- b. Must show proficiency in the area of math
- c. Must be a good all-round student
- d. Must be planning to attend a post-secondary institution
- e. French 30
- f. Financial need may be a factor

10. Evert and Ida Johnson Award

- a. Criteria determined by the Awards Committee of HCI

11. Francis Catherine Gerwing Award

- a. Must demonstrate academic proficiency
- b. Must be entering the field of nursing or medicine

12. Governor General Award

Lord Dufferin, Canada's third Governor General after Confederation, created the Academic Medals in 1873 to encourage academic excellence across the nation. Over the years, they have become the most prestigious award that students in Canadian schools can receive.

For more than 140 years, the Governor General's Academic Medals have recognized the outstanding scholastic achievements of students in Canada. They are awarded to the student graduating with the highest average from a high school, as well as from approved college or university programs. Pierre Trudeau, Tommy Douglas, Kim Campbell, Robert Bourassa, Robert Stanfield and Gabrielle Roy are just some of the more than 50,000 people who have received the Governor General's Academic Medal as the start of a life full of accomplishments.

Today, the Governor General's Academic Medals are awarded at four distinct levels: Bronze at the secondary school level; Collegiate Bronze at the post-secondary, diploma level; Silver at the undergraduate level; and Gold at the graduate level. Medals are presented on behalf of the Governor General by participating educational institutions, along with personalized certificates signed by the Governor General. There is no monetary award associated with the Medal.

13. HCI Kosmynka Awards for Acting and Technical

- a. Must demonstrate a high degree of involvement and participation in the theatrical and musical arts

14. Henry Kloppenburg Mathematics Scholarship

- a. Must demonstrate academic excellence
- b. Must show proficiency in mathematics
- c. Must be planning to attend a post-secondary institution

15. Horizon School Division Student Recognition Award

This award will be presented annually to a graduating student who best exemplifies the Horizon School Division vision of "A Community of Learning and Achieving". The principal, in consultation with staff, from each high school will select one of their students as the student who they feel best embodies the vision "A Community of Learning and Achieving"

16. HSA Chartered Professional Accountants Business Scholarship - est. 2019

- a. Must be graduating in the year they apply for the scholarship
- b. Must pursue a business diploma (2 year) or degree at a Saskatchewan post-secondary institution
- c. Applications considered based on student's academic achievement in business related high school courses and business related volunteer experience

17. Humboldt Alliance Church Scholarship

- a. Must be graduating grade 12 with at least a 75% average
- b. Must be entering post-secondary studies for the 2021-2022 academic year. Preference will be given to those entering an accredited Christian Institution
- c. Provide a written description of faith-based living in accordance to scripture
- d. Provide a written vision statement
- e. Give a written testimony of your faith journey
- f. Financial need may be considered
- g. Please submit application to humboldtalliance1@sasktel.net by **Friday May 14, 2021**

18. Humboldt Co-op Bursaries

- a. **Children of Humboldt Co-op Bursary**
 - i. Open to grade 12 students whose parent or guardian has held employment with the Humboldt Co-op since at least September 1, 2020.
- b. **Student Bursary**
 - i. Open to grade 12 students who have held employment with the Humboldt Co-op since at least September 1, 2020 and until at least June 15, 2021.
- c. Award recipients will be selected by the Humboldt Co-op organization.

19. Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce Award

- a. Be enrolled in the fall of 2021 in any first-year St. Peter's College or Carlton Trail College program
- b. Be currently employed with, or have been employed in the past, with a Chamber member
- c. Demonstrate commitment and involvement with business, industry and/or community within the Humboldt region
- d. Provide a letter of reference from Humboldt and District Chamber of Commerce (HDCC) employer
- e. Information and application forms are available online at www.humboldtchamber.ca
- f. Submit application and reference letter directly to HDCC by **Friday May 14, 2021**

20. Humboldt Knights of Columbus Scholarship

- a. Applicant must be a member of the current years graduating class
- b. Father or grandfather is a Knights of Columbus member
- c. Will be enrolling full time in post-secondary education in the upcoming academic year at a Catholic college in Saskatchewan
- d. Have a strong commitment to his/her school, community and church
- e. Demonstrate satisfactory academic achievement
- f. Applicants will submit a letter to the Knights of Columbus Selection Committee indicating:
 - i. Post-secondary education plans, including the name of the institution being attended, and proposed course of study
 - ii. Experiences in school, community, and church activities, including volunteerism
 - iii. Any special interests, achievements, and hobbies
 - iv. Academic results and teacher references would be helpful
 - v. Submit letter of application by mail to P.O. Box 1288, Humboldt, SK, S0K2A0 to be received by K. of C. by no later than **Friday May 14, 2021**

21. Humboldt Vision Centre Scholarships (one male and one female recipient)

- a. All applicants must complete a 1 - 3-page word-processed essay on the topic "How school and athletics have influenced my life"
- b. Must demonstrate a high degree of involvement in high school athletics
- c. Must be going to attend a post-secondary institution
- d. Financial need may be a factor

22. Jacob Leicht Memorial Scholarship - Humboldt Hockey Male/Female - est. 2019

Jacob Leicht graduated from Humboldt Collegiate Institute in 2017. At the age of 19, Jacob lost his life in the Humboldt Broncos crash on April 6, 2018. Jacob was a quiet leader who *modelled kindness, humility, perseverance, self-discipline, and courage*. He was inclusive of all those around him.

Jacob was dedicated on and off the ice, putting in the extra time to maintain honour roll status throughout grades 9-12. He was enrolled in a post-secondary university class while playing for the Humboldt Broncos; taking an interest in kinesiology as physical fitness was important to him. Jacob pushed himself to be the best he could be, in all facets of living. The Jacob Leicht Memorial Scholarship will be awarded to a grade 12 student who is a member in good standing that:

- a. Shows a hardworking, selfless approach to the game of hockey
- b. Displays strong leadership skills and community involvement
- c. Is a team player on and off the ice
- d. Played U18 and is graduating from Humboldt Collegiate Institute
- e. Is proceeding with post-secondary education on a full or part-time basis
- f. Payment will be dispersed upon receipt of paid tuition

23. Ken Lockinger Memorial Scholarship

- a. A scholarship will be awarded to a Humboldt Minor Hockey Association (HMHA) registered member who applies and best satisfies the qualifications set out in this application. The HMHA wants to give recognition to an association member who has displayed commitment to hockey while participating in the HMHA System, and encourage the pursuit of their career aspirations through further education.
- b. The purpose of the scholarship is to provide financial assistance to an individual who has participated in the HMHA system, is graduating from Humboldt Collegiate Institute, and has chosen to further their education at a post-secondary institution of their choice. The value of the scholarship is \$1000.00.
- c. To be eligible, a scholarship candidate must be:
 - i. A current registered member of the Humboldt Minor Hockey Association (HMHA)
 - ii. In their graduation year at Humboldt Collegiate Institute (HCI)
 - iii. Accepted and enrolling in a post-secondary program in the year immediately following graduation from HCI.
 - iv. Registered for a minimum of three (3) years in the HMHA, either as a player, on-ice official, or team official
- d. The application of eligible scholarship candidates will be assessed based on the following qualifications:
 - i. Academic achievement
 - ii. Positive attitude in school
 - iii. School and/or community participation and service
 - iv. High level of commitment, sportsmanship, and leadership in hockey
 - v. Passion for the sport of hockey

24. Kinetite Club of Humboldt Scholarship

- a. Must be enrolled in a post-secondary institution in the fall following graduating from high school. Must request the funds at that time
- b. Community Involvement
- c. Academic Marks - minimum 70% average
- d. The winning student must send an official confirmation of enrollment to the Kinetite Club of Humboldt president once enrolled

25. Pay It Forward Scholarship

- a. Initial funding for this scholarship was donated to Humboldt Collegiate from schools across Canada following the 2018 Humboldt Broncos tragedy. Continued funding for this scholarship will be made possible from the teaching and support staff at Humboldt Collegiate
- b. The award recipient for the Pay It Forward Scholarship must demonstrate:
 - i. The pursuit of excellence in academics, athletics, and/or the arts
 - ii. Lifelong learning by pursuing post-secondary education
 - iii. Other criteria as determined by the Awards Committee

26. R. John and Agnes Adams Award

- a. Demonstrate academic excellence
- b. Must be taking or have taken ELA A 30, ELA B 30, one level 30 Math, one level 30 Science, one level 30 Social Studies, a second language, and two other level 30 classes
- c. Must be planning to attend university

27. Royal Canadian Legion Scholarship

- a. Must be a faithful volunteer in school and community programs
- b. Must be planning on pursuing post-secondary education

28. Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship Industry Scholarships

- a. Awarded to select students that have complete the Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship program
- b. Award recipients selected by the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship & Trades Commission

29. Schulich Leader Scholarship Nominee

- a. Scholarship was created to inspire the next generation of technology innovators
- b. Supports the top students in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) across Canada
- c. Eligible to win up to \$100 000 in scholarship funding
- d. Award winners and nominees are part of a growing network of Canada's leading STEM scholars

30. Spirit of Humboldt Collegiate Award

- a. Must demonstrate academic excellence, outstanding leadership and the ability to communicate with peers and supervisory staff
- b. Must be involved in long-term volunteer programs in the school which may include: student government, athletics, fine arts, or school clubs such as Yearbook, SAS, etc...
- c. Must be planning on attending a post-secondary institution

31. Student Representative Council (SRC) Student Advocacy Awards - est. 2017

- a. Students demonstrate the ability to communicate with peers and staff
- b. Students demonstrate leadership in the areas of anti-bullying, leading by example, and being an advocate for others
- c. Students demonstrate the school's core virtues: *Respect for Self and Others, Responsibility and Leadership, Trust and Loyalty, Honesty, Justice and Fairness, Self-Discipline, Patience and Understanding, and Humility*
- d. Students may be involved in volunteer programs in the school which may include: student government, athletics, fine arts, or school clubs such as Yearbook, SAS, etc...

32. St. Elizabeth Hospital Ladies Auxiliary Award

- a. Must demonstrate academic excellence
- b. Must be attending a post-secondary institution in the field of medical sciences

33. St. Peter's College Accelerated Scholarships

- a. Selections based on:
 - i. Academic Rigour
 - ii. Academic Performance
 - iii. Academic Responsibility
 - iv. Independent Learning
 - v. Strive to Succeed
- b. Powerful and effective learning skills
- c. Students must be self-directed learners
- d. Take pride and initiative in creating an effective and efficient learning environment
- e. Rigour that students achieve academic excellence is relative to:
 - i. Academic difficulty of classes
 - ii. Little to no re-assessments
 - iii. Extra-Curricular activities, employment, life events, etc...

34. Tyler Bieber Memorial Award presented by DirectWest

In honour of Tyler Bieber, an alumni of Humboldt Collegiate Institute (HCI) who lost his life in the bus tragedy of 2018, Directwest is proud to honour his memory and his impact in the community through a scholarship for the third year. This scholarship is for the graduating student at HCI that best represents what Tyler stood for. Tyler's commitment to volunteering, community, and sport in the Humboldt area was second to none. Whenever he was asked to do something or wherever he was asked to be, Tyler was always the first to come and the last to leave. This was shown in his commitment to coaching at HCI, volunteering in the community including Big Brothers and Big Sisters programs and anywhere else someone needed a hand or a little extra support. In 2018, Tyler was nominated for the Citizen of the Year award in the City of Humboldt for all his efforts.

People close to him described Tyler as a quiet person, but beneath that was a truly competitive spirit. Coach Bieber wanted to win as bad as anyone else but winning for Tyler was not only about the score. Making an impact, being a leader, mentor, friend, and watching the people he worked with grow were all victories to him.

The selflessness and impact Tyler had on the school, its athletes, and the community can not be understated. Tyler embodied the values of accountability, excellence, positivity, and leadership which Directwest aspires to as well. It is for this reason that Directwest sponsors a scholarship in honour of Tyler Bieber in the amount of \$500.

Award Recipient Requirements

The Tyler Bieber Scholarship can be awarded to a graduating student that meets the following criteria as determined by Humboldt Collegiate Institute:

- a. Volunteerism and Community Involvement (60%): There are plenty of opportunities for young people to give time to help others in the community. This was a large part of who Tyler was and will reflect the largest part of the awards criteria.
- b. Participation in School Athletics (30%): Not limited to players only but also to equipment managers, regular score clock/tournament help, volunteers, etc...
- c. Academics (10%): A rounded person who can make an impact in the school, in the community, and succeed in the classroom.
